We do need volunteers for some of the tasks connected with putting on the exhibition. These

are not terribly time consuming tasks. If we get a few volunteers then there is a little work for several people instead of a lot to do for one or two people. Below is a list of the jobs needed with a description of each job.

- Awards and Ribbons: Someone to take charge of ordering and bringing the ribbons to the show. This person would design cards to place on the wall near the paintings, which designate the award winners. This person would also co-ordinate the prize money with the ribbons at the exhibition.
- 2. Volunteer coordinator: Calls volunteers who have checked off their choice on the entry form. Send info to volunteers regarding their responsibilities, if necessary. Oversees check-in making sure volunteers have necessary supplies. Greets and introduces volunteers to each other. (I have someone who will call the volunteers but will need someone to do the rest of the job.)
- 3. Designer for the reminder cards, which will be sent in August. Take care of getting prospectuses, posters and invitations to art centers and art stores. I have already done the prospectus design and the invitation design.

By taking on a small part of the overall effort, you can help keep the Exhibition Chairs from being overwhelmed, and help us continue to offer two stunning shows each year. Please make an effort to pitch in and help.

## Meet Our Fall Show Judge Louise Gillis



Classically trained in Minnesota, Louise loves to paint and is equally at home with water-colors and oils in portraiture, still lifes, figures and landscape painting. She has studied in Tokyo and Madrid and was resident artist at the Adzak in Paris, the Black Hills of South Dakota and Maui, Hawaii. She also has extensive museum study of the old masters and impressionists in the United States and Europe and was a registered painter at the Tuilleries in Paris.

While nature is in a constant state of evolution, Gillis captures particular moments in time that represent seasonal brilliance.
